The Indian Education Program receives funding to serve Native American students in Norman Public Schools from two federal sources to ensure Indian children receive educational opportunities that otherwise may not be provided. The Title VI Program is funded by the U.S. Department of Education and the Johnson–O'Malley Program is funded by the U.S. Department of the Interior. Services for both programs are guided by a parent committee and we invite you to join our parent meetings and events throughout the school year.

Mission Statement

The Indian Education program provides paths that foster character, cultural awareness, and academic excellence in our students to empower them to reach their full potential to positively impact the world. Through integrity, culture, and community, our program maximizes district, community and tribal resources to serve students and families.

Land Acknowledgment

We recognize and acknowledge the people who inhabited these lands before the United States was established.

Long before the Norman Public School district and community were founded, the land on which our community now resides was the traditional homelands of the Caddo Nation and the Wichita and Affiliated Tribes. We acknowledge the territory once served as a hunting ground, trade exchange point, and area of migration for the Apache, Comanche, Kiowa, Quapaw, and Osage Nations. We acknowledge the Muscogee and Seminole Nations who were once assigned the land upon which our schools sit. We honor all tribes who have a historic relationship with the region.

Today, 39 distinct Native Nations reside in Oklahoma as a result of settler and colonial policies that were designed to assimilate Native people. We are as diverse culturally and linguistically as other nations found globally, and our histories and cultures are now interwoven into this community and country.

The Choctaw people call the land "Okla-Homma", meaning "red people", the place we all now call home.

This acknowledgment is aligned with our core value of creating a diverse and inclusive community. It is an institutional responsibility to recognize and acknowledge the people, culture, and history that make up our community.

Funding Sources

Johnson-O'Malley

The Johnson-O'Malley program is a federally funded program under the Department of the Interior, whose main objective is to ensure American Indian children receive educational opportunities that would not otherwise be provided through the public school system.

ENROLLMENT CRITERIA

NPS parents/guardians are required to enroll their child in the program by providing tribal documentation in order to receive services. How to obtain services are detailed hereafter.

TRIBAL DOCUMENTATION

Tribal citizenship or CDIB Information or eligibility for tribal citizenship or 1/4 of descendency.



Title VI

Title VI is a federally funded program under the U.S. Department of Education. The primary purpose of the program is to provide educational and culturally related services to Native American students enrolled in a public school. To participate, a student must have a completed enrollment form on file. a tribal enrollment number. and a card or CDIB. Once your child is enrolled in the Title VI program, they will remain enrolled until your child graduates or leaves the school district.

ENROLLMENT CRITERIA

To access services, parents/guardians are required to fill out an enrollment form available on the program website.

TRIBAL DOCUMENTATION

NPS parents/guardians are strongly encouraged to provide tribal citizenship or other documentation. Tribal citizenship supersedes the CDIB.

Frequently Asked Questions

How do I enroll my child in the Indian Education Program?

Fill out a Title VI enrollment form and send the form and a copy of the tribal information to the Indian Education Office or email it to Iharjo2@normanps.org.

What is an ED506 form?

This is the Title VI enrollment form and is the official record of eligibility for each student enrolled in the Title VI program.

Who is eligible to enroll in the Indian Education Program?

If you, your child, or the student's grandparent(s) are an enrolled member of a federally or state—recognized Indian or Alaska Native tribe, then the student is eligible to enroll.

Where do I send the Title VI enrollment form?

Enrollment forms can be turned in to the school office. Request for the form to be sent to the Indian Education Office. Original Title VI enrollment forms are required for program records.

Our family does not need financial assistance, should we still fill out the Title VI application?

Yes, please. Student services are based on our student count, and the student count is based on enrollment forms received.

My child does not have tribal documentation, should I fill out the Title VI application?

Yes, parent or grandparent tribal documentation can be submitted for the child.


We live outside tribal boundaries, should we fill out a Title VI enrollment form?

Yes, students from the 574 federally recognized tribes and state—recognized tribes are eligible for services.


